Many of you are members of our school Facebook group hence have seen the message I placed about a potential new school residential for next year's Year Six cohort. The amount of positivity I have received about this means I am pursuing a booking for next year but plan to visit the site first before committing the school. This visit will take place on Wednesday 30th June and I will report back after. For those of you not on Facebook, I will copy the message below.

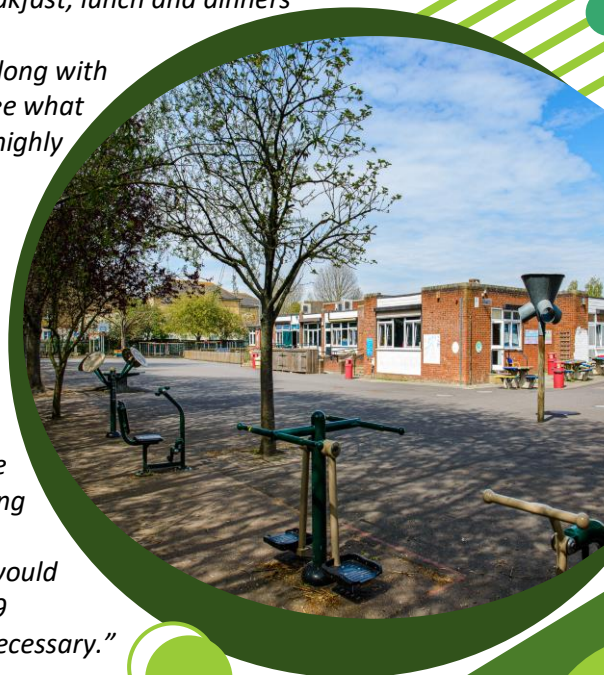
"As part of our commitment to providing children with experiences that families sometimes may find more challenging to provide, we are looking at improving our school residential in Year Six.

School residentials are absolutely essential within a child's development as they help children to become more independent, be away from home and learn skills of teamwork and co-operation.

I am proposing we book a PGL centre called Bawdsey Hall, located in a beautiful setting on the Suffolk coast. I am considering a two night booking in July 2022, meaning children would depart on a Wednesday morning and return Friday afternoon. They will be staying in tents of about four to five people that have a concrete base and have proper beds inside. Children would need to bring their own pillows and sleeping bags. They will receive cooked breakfast, lunch and dinners throughout the stay including a choice of options.

The activities on offer include raft building, buggy building, zip wire, abseiling along with camp fires, hiking, beach walk etc. At this stage I would not be able to guarantee what activities would be on offer but there would be an excellent selection all led by highly qualified individuals who ensure everything is safe. There will also be a good number of school staff accompanying. I imagine the first question many of you have is cost. This is hard to determine as the more children who sign up, the cheaper the coach journey becomes. I have also allocated £8,000 from the school budget to help fund this opportunity (showing how valuable the school considers such an opportunity). I anticipate the cost per pupil will be £120 although I may well be able to reduce this further depending on numbers. For Pupil Premium families I would be looking at a cost of around £70. I recognise this is a substantial amount hence I want to gauge interest before booking. We would need an initial deposit of £30 which would be non-refundable and then we would allow 10 monthly payments of around £9 (£5 for Pupil Premium). I am happy to arrange a Zoom meeting for parents if necessary."



Finally, I know some parents are keen to find out who their child's teacher will be next year. I plan to share this information on Friday 9th July when I hope children will get a chance to meet their new teacher. **Please do remember what was shared earlier in the year that Year Three and Year Five classes will be mixed to ensure classes are balanced in terms of ability and behaviour as well as providing an opportunity for children to work with a wider variety of others.**

Year Three

In our English lessons this week, Year 3 have studied the problems and resolutions that often occur in myths and legends. This has allowed the children to flex their creative muscles by planning their own legend in a setting they have chosen. For Maths, we have learned about 2D and 3D shapes. Our Design and Technology unit is called 'Moving Monsters' because we are preparing to make a monster toy that moves using air to open and close its mouth. To help us understand how this can be achieved, we made a simple pneumatic system which inflates and deflates a balloon using a syringe.



Year Four

We have had such a busy and exciting week in Year Four. On Monday we were all entertained by a fantastic theatre production of Treasure Island. We especially loved singing along to the sea shanties. We had even more fun singing on Tuesday when we made our record-breaking attempt singing 'Lovely Day'. In English, we have continued our study of Carrie's War by writing a diary entry about Carrie's birthday and in geography we have compared and contrasted our modern lives with the traditional lifestyle of the Yanomami tribe who live in the Amazon rainforest. In maths, we are continuing our work on the properties of shape. We had a practical lesson on Thursday where we had to create our own shapes using materials such as lolly sticks. It was great

fun seeing how many different shapes we could make. We have also started our new design and technology unit this week. We are looking at seasonal foods and have made our own jam and fruit tarts. We also had a special science treat today organised by Mr Marbe. We were lucky enough to be visited by some amazing animals that we could see up close and in some cases even touch. We learnt so much about their habitats and behaviour and we had the opportunity to ask lots of questions of our own too.



Year Five

This week in Year 5, we have been continuing with our new Ultimate Explorers topic, looking at the non-fiction e-book of that name. The children have been developing their skills in skimming and scanning the text for information, making comparisons within the text and drawing inferences then form an opinion. They have then used this information to argue their viewpoint in a debate using evidence from the text to support their views. They have now also begun researching about rainforests and what it would be like to explore them in preparation for writing their own page of the e-book to be used by Year 4 children in their forthcoming study of rainforests in Geography. In Maths, we have been continuing our work on properties of shape. The children have been looking at quadrilaterals and their properties; calculating lengths and angles in shapes and then also practising some arithmetical skills using formal written methods for addition and



subtraction. In Science, the children have been looking at how humans change over time and have produced some scatter graphs charting changes in height and handspan over a year and used the graph to analyse their data. In geography, the children have been continuing their research on the River Nile finding information in fact files and then showing their comprehension skills by answering a series of questions about it. Finally, In PE, we haven't allowed the rain to stop play in our cricket unit and have moved inside to the sports hall to develop skills in batting.

Year Six

In English this week, pupils have planned and written stories based in an abandoned building or setting. The children have thought about tension and language that is chosen to create an impact. They have also thought about the cohesion of their story as a whole. In maths the children have drawn accurate shapes using a protractor and have ensured that all the angles they have drawn are precise. They have also found ways to calculate the total degrees of the interior angles of any polygon. Computing this week has seen the children using the combined skills learnt over the previous computing sessions to create their own spreadsheets recording data of their own choosing. Many children chose this opportunity to record data about the UEFA European Football Championships. The children have also completed a second session this week with local youth workers, preparing them for transition to secondary school.



They also really enjoyed taking part in the record breaking sing of 'Lovely Day'.
