Dear Parent/Carer,

We have now been back a whole complete week! Time has certainly passed quickly and it is wonderful to see how well all of the pupils have adapted to our new arrangements and have settled into their classes.

Thank you for your continued support with our staggered drop off and collection arrangements. I do completely understand how challenging these can be, especially if you have children in multiple year groups or schools. In order to support social distancing, please could I request that once you have dropped off or collected your child, you leave the school site immediately. In addition, if you do have to wait for older children, please could you ensure you are standing away from Village Infant School's gate as we are aware this area is becoming particularly congested. Thank you for your support with these matters.

This week, I met with the parks team at the local council. The school is extremely well placed, next to a fantastically large park, and I am very keen to ensure we make full use of this! I am delighted to share that, following our discussions, the council have agreed to install and fund a new entrance into our school site from Old Dagenham

Park! The advantages of this is that we will be able to provide additional entry/exit into the school at the start and end of the school day which should mean parents will not need to wait as long if they have multiple children at the school. This will also decrease congestion on the drive that connects us with Village Infant School and Ford Road Children's Centre.

This new entry/exit point will also make it easier for us to use the large park for recreation and PE lessons and the council will be supporting the school with painting pitches and ensuring the park is kept in a clean and tidy state. This includes the nature area to the back of the school. They have also offered the school opportunities to help with planting and caring for this area.

Obviously a project such as this does not happen overnight but we are all working in partnership with the aim of having our new gate open operational by October Half Term. Until then, I ask for your continued support with ensuring all users of our site are kept safe through social distancing and minimising the amount of time spent close to the school.


Chewing Gum

We have completed another exciting week at William Ford and, as staff, we continue to be amazed at their determination and resilience. They have shown great creativity in their writing and have produced a number of poems inspired by book 'Here We Are.' We have also written a poem based on the Louis Armstrong song 'What a wonderful world' by changing it into our own words to include things we think are wonderful. This week our focus in Maths has been on developing the children's understanding of place value by counting up and down in hundreds past the number 1000 and by representing numbers using place value grids. The children continue to wow us with their artistic flair and have this week used ink to create an Andy Warhol style print.



Year Four

This week, Year 4 have thought about people who are special to them and written a postcard to that person describing some special shared memories. We then considered what qualities about ourselves we demonstrate in our interactions with each other. In maths we have completed consolidation work based on place value.

Have you been wondering what your children were up to in school?

Well, wonder no more....

We have also started our topic about sound in our science lessons. In P.E. we have begun playing handball out in the playground. Well done to all the children who remembered to come to school in their P.E. kit on Wednesday.



Year Five

This week in Year 5, we have continued to work on PSHE and English based on the Here We Are unit looking at our place in the world. We have talked about all the things and people that are special to us and written informal letters to a special person, which the children are taking home for that person.

We have also talked about improvements that we would like to see to the school environment and the broader curriculum and children have written formal letters to people who they think might be able to help us with improvement works or organising trips or visits into school.

In Maths, we have focussed on arithmetic and problem-solving tests so that we can begin to identify particular areas that we will need to work on for each child to ensure that they can be working at the level that we would expect in Year 5. We have also begun to work on place value in 5-digit numbers.

In art we have continued to study the work of Georgia O'Keefe and the children have created their own original piece in her style and worked collaboratively to create a shared composite reproduction of one of her works.



In PE, we have worked on ball handling and passing skills in Rugby.

Year Six

This week, the children have been writing letters to special people in their lives. They have thought about all the wonderful things that other people do for them and why these people are so important in helping them to be who they are.



They have also continued to investigate and experiment with different types of African art. The children have drawn their own patterns based on the work of the Ndebele people of South Africa and have enjoyed creating Tinga Tinga animals influenced by the artwork of Edward Tingatinga from Tanzania.
