This week Jireh Stephen in 6L reports our sponsor children.

We have learned more about our sponsor children in Columbia this week in a special assembly given by the charity Standby Me. In Year 5 and 6 we are sponsoring Enrique. We have received a letter from him which was really interesting and have written responses which will be sent to Enrique to read and reply back. Year 6 have also started a new Geography unit where we are learning about South America and will find out lots about Colombia. Year 3 are sponsoring Shaira and Year 4 Yarleidis and have also written letters.

Day trip to France!

Those of you on our Facebook group will be aware we have been considering a day trip to France for our pupils. I am delighted to share that we have now provisionally made a booking. The trip will involve leaving William Ford at 6:30am and returning at 8:30pm.

We will be travelling by luxury coach and ferry, spending time in Boulogne old town, at a local bakery (where children will make croissants) and visiting a chocolate factory. The proposed date is Friday 22nd April 2022 hence we won't be sending out letters until September. I hope to be able to reduce the cost of the trip to £40 per pupil (£20 for free school meal families).





Swimming for Year Six

We have compared Celtic warriors with Roman soldiers in history and looked at primary sources of evidence to help inform us.

Year Five

We have had a very enjoyable and exciting return to school after the Easter break this week, starting lots of new curriculum topics in most of the subjects. Everyone is very happy to be back.

In English, we have begun our new topic on the Greek Myths, which was developed 3 years ago by Cambridge University and piloted by a small number of schools including William Ford. The first myth that we have studied is the famous story of King Midas. The children have been able to explore the text closely looking for evidence of King Midas' character, using their important reading comprehension inference skills to work out what he is like from his words and actions. They have then used their findings to write their own character description of King Midas.

In Maths, we have been looking at decimals, adding and subtracting them within 1 and looking at complements within 1. We have been completing our unit on the UK in Geography by looking at rivers in the UK. This will lead nicely into our next topic of Rivers, which we will be starting next week and, if Covid restrictions allow, usually culminates in a trip to Eastbrookend Country Park to study the Rivers Rom and Beam

Year Six

The children in Year Six have really enjoyed finding out about the children in Colombia that the school are sponsoring. In English, the pupils have planned, drafted and written letters to Enrique, one of the children. They have ensured that they have written in a friendly and informal style and have asked him lots of interesting questions. They are really looking forward to his reply.

In maths, the children have started a unit of work looking at statistics. They have looked specifically at line graphs and have begun to think about their uses. They have realised that this type of graph is used in many different subjects and have interpreted the information found in a range of graphs. They have also used given data to successfully create their own graphs.

Geography this week has seen the children introduced to the new topic of South America. They were surprised by how many countries they already knew. The children have used atlases to locate the countries, overseas territories and capital cities

out about the Swedish botanist Carl Linnaeus and how he introduced the taxonomy system that we still use nearly three hundred years later.

Year Three

We were pleased to have Year 3 back this week after the Easter break. Our English lessons have been focused on writing shape poems, and the children have amazed us by creating a number of poems about and in the shape of different animals. For Maths, we have been approaching the tricky subject of fractions, including learning about tenths and decimals. The children have flexed their creative muscles in our RE lessons by working in groups to produce posters demonstrating what they have learned about Easter.



Year Four

It has been lovely to welcome the Year Four children back after the Easter In English, we have been holidays. out focussing on setting punctuating direct speech. It's been quite tricky but the children have tried really hard with it. In maths, we have been continuing working on telling the time on an analogue clock face and converting it to digital time. This is something that the children would really benefit from practising at home. This week, all year groups have been introduced to the charity Stand By Me.
