Dear parents and carers,
We may be close to the end of term but the fun and learning has certainly not stopped at William Ford! From Roman Day to Sport's Day; Baghdad Day to Transition, the school has been a flurry of activity. Year Six have also finished and compiled their end of term video which will be uploaded to our school website early next week for you to enjoy.

Step Four COVID protocols – changes for September

Sadly, COVID has rightly been a focus of many newsletters over the past year and this one will be no exception. Although we are all fully aware that the pandemic is not over, the Government have indicated to schools that we should aim to return to normal. As a result, in September we will not be operating a bubble system. Lunch will return to the dinner hall and assemblies will resume in person. Parents will be able to choose which entrance to the school site they use. Arrival time at school will be between 8:45 and 8:55 to prevent crowding at any gate and we still won't be permitting parents on the school site in the mornings. In the afternoons for collection, gates will open at 3:10pm, just before the pupils finish at 3:15pm. We are trialling a new collection arrangement now that we have access from multiple gates. Children will be released from the classrooms via the classroom fire exits into the playground. For 3H and 3P, this will be using the small playground near the sports hall. 6N will be released from the entrance between Year Five and Six. Parents are required to wait in the respective playgrounds away from windows and doors. Parents certainly should not look through windows or knock on doors. When the teacher opens the fire exit, they will release children one at a time when they see the correct parent. Please bear with us at the start of the year as teachers will have a lot of new parents to recognise! If you have children in multiple classes, please collect your younger children first. This will not be an opportunity to speak to teachers as they will be busy dismissing children. We hope this new arrangement supports parents with using the entrance/exit closest to their homes whilst ensuring all pupils leave with the correct adult. We do also ask that parents leave the school site as quickly as possible once they have collected their child(ren). Classrooms will continue to have hand sanitizer in them but we will not be sanitising at the gates. **I must stress this is a trial and may well change next year. Also, regulations may change over the summer so please ensure you keep monitoring your emails.**

This is the last newsletter of the academic year. It is also time to say farewell to our Year Six pupils and assure them of our continued prayers as they take the next step in their Educational journey. their educational journey. We will certainly miss them all.

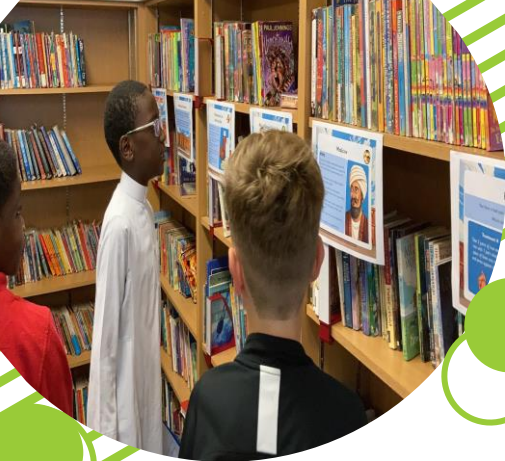

In RE, we came to the end of our unit on the gospels with an assessment activity where the children produced a church noticeboard detailing all the things that they have studied in RE this term."
