What a lovely week we had in Year 3 this week! In English we started on our new non-fiction unit Was Tutankhamen Killed? We are now all part of a crime squad working hard to solve this mystery. We firstly started looking at features of non-fiction texts and now we are exploring which bits of the text count as evidence and how much of this evidence might be useful to our investigation.

This is all really exciting as it ties in perfectly with our history topic Ancient Egypt. As we have been exploring how Howard Carter discovered Tutankhamen's tomb, we are trying to understand what his life might have been like, using all the sources from Carter's exploration.

We used our shadow puppets which we made in our art lesson to further Year Five



topic, we've been learning a song called The Gift from recording Nile.

This week in English, the children learned about the 1914 First World War Christmas truce. They all worked especially hard when completing their written work and their writing was lovely to read.
