Learning Council


This week Eliora and Jane in Year 6 write about some exciting developments.





Headlice!

We are now finalising arrangements. We must have copies of all passports in school in order that we can check dates as the post BREXIT rules are very strict. We also require all families who have children attending France to apply for a free GHIC card in the extremely unlikely event that medical care is required. This can be applied for via this link Applying for healthcare cover abroad (GHIC and EHIC) - NHS (www.nhs.uk) or by Googling 'GHIC.' Parents need to apply for themselves then add their children onto the application. If your child is travelling on a non-EU/UK passport, please do speak to us about visa requirements. Year Three

It's the end of a very busy week in Year and Three. In Maths we started a topic on imp fractions and we were more than half glad that the children showed a great understanding of this difficult topic. The children have learnt to identify fractions including shading shapes, how to add fractions and how to make a whole.

In RE this week we learnt about the Jewish rite of passage commonly referred to as Bar or Bat Mitzvah. This is actually name given to Jewish boys aged 13 and Jewish girls aged 12 who are now considered to be adults. As part of this we discussed what it means to be an adult and start to take responsibility for their own learning.

In English we continued using headings and sub-headings to help us organise our sentences into paragraphs and the children wrote their own report on the subject of - 'Where would I like to live?'. In Science we continued our topic of



Rocks and Soils. This week the children had the opportunity to study some rocks close up before describing their texture and appearance and using a key to find out what kinds of rocks they were.

We are very much looking forward to speaking to you at Parents' Evening next week even though it is going to be on a screen. Thank you for your continued support and enjoy a restful weekend.

Year Four

In maths this week, Year 4 have been continuing with our work on fractions.

We have introduced mixed numbers and improper fractions and although this work is challenging the children




have worked hard to improve their understanding. In English we have planned and written a character description based on the story 'Basia's Birthday Present'. We have specifically looked at descriptive language and starting our sentences with fronted adverbials and adjectives. In science we have introduced 'evaporation' and this will lead on to the children planning their own evaporation experiment. We have concluded our work on Hinduism in R.E. and the children were assessed on their learning this week. We are now moving on to our Christian Salvation unit. This week in geography we labelled the world's continents and introduced our work on Europe. The children are continuing to develop their clarinet playing and their understanding of musical notation. They can now play a range of tunes. The pupils who have been attending their swimming lessons are already much more confident and progress is already amazing, especially for the non-swimmers.

Year Five

Another amazing week has flown by. Year 5 have begun a new unit in English, where we will be writing raps. We have been looking at how poems and raps are similar and we have discovered the types of figurative language used in both. As a class, we have begun the writing process by writing a rap

together. We really enjoyed performing them! In our maths lessons we have continued with our fractions unit, finishing the week by using all our learning to help us play some fantastic fractions games! In our new geography unit, we have been finding out about the features of a river and building on the learning from Year 4 by extending our use of geographical vocabulary to help us describe them. In R.E., we have wrapped up our People of God unit by answering the question 'How can following God bring freedom or justice?'. The children had to use all the knowledge they had learnt throughout the unit to write in depth. Our computing unit is focussing spreadsheets where we are learning how to use formulae.



Year Six

Year 6 have continued this week their topic on Narrative Poetry by studying

the mysterious poem 'The Listeners' and have started to draft their own story about the traveller from the poem. Our Maths focus has

been on finding



the area of triangles and parallelograms, as well as practising our arithmetic skills in preparation for the SATs tests after Easter. The pupils have also begun to write a non-chronological report covering a broad range of topics on healthy lifestyle choices to complete their current Science unit on the human body
