n Beussent Lachelle. During our tour the children ate baguettes, made bread, saw chocolate meaning made and enjoyed some free samples too. They ate in the ferry restaurant, enjoyed the sensation of the ferry rocking on the sea and were amaze $^{
m d}$  at the views of England disappearing into the distance and France coming into sight. Some pupils even believe that they saw sharks, dolphins and a mermaid but to be honest, this is quite unlikely!

So, a great day out but how did the pupils benefit? Has their French improved as a result of this experience? To be honest probably not! However, they have experienced a whole new culture and seen and heard French being spoken outside of the classroom. They have had the opportunity to speak some French to locals and along with reading foreign signs. They have also seen the benefit of learning a language in order to understand others and being able to communicate effective abroad. But the benefits go further. Pupils now as young as seven have gained independence as much was expected of them on this trip. They ordered their own meals in the self-service restaurant from ferry staff unfamiliar to them. whose first language was not English. They have seen the etiquette of eating in a restaurant, They have learnt the importance of ensuring they go to the toilet when one is available,

recognising that sometimes you just have to wait! Most importantly, we believe that we have created memories that will last a lifetime and have encouraged our pupils to explore the world even more as they get older. Our day trip to France is part of our commitment at William Ford of 11 experiences we want to offer to all pupils before they leave us in Year Six from representing the school in music, art or sport to experiencing a residential; from serving the local community to visiting a foreign country. This is all part of our commitment to the pupils' personal development and how we enrich the curriculum. There is every possibility that as you are reading this, our Year 5 and 6 trip is well underway (who are likely to also pop across the border into Belgium)! This week we have covered the temptation to disobey – both God and our parents. Next week we will consider the temptation to lie.

# Well, wonder no more....

Next week, as part of our Design and Technology work, the first of the year three classes are visiting Pizza Express to find out how pizzas are made. Children in 3H must make sure they are in school by 8.30 on Tuesday. 3D and 3P will look forward to their visits later in the term

In maths, we have continued looking at decimals and in English we have started working on our new text based on Beverley Naidoo's novel called 'Journey to Jo-burg'. We have also used atlases to identify the capital cities of European countries within our goegraphy lessons. In science, we have looked at the various ways states of matter can change. In R.E we have been learning about the practice of Communion within Christianity. The children have written a guide to Communion for a younger child. Last week, was the school's British Values Day. Year Four examined the value of respect and tolerance of others. As part of this, we looked at the poem 'People Equal' by the poet James Berry. With a partner, we then wrote our own poem based on the same theme. The children's poems were very thoughtful indeed.

#### **Year Five**

It was a lovely to experience watching an immersive take on Shakespeare's play Hamlet at Dagenham park on our first day back in the summer term, the children loved watching it and loved the betrayal and love themes throughout and the fun and engaging songs they

This week the children have used all their fractions knowledge to answer a range of problem-solving questions which have been fun and challenging. The children also went to Dagenham park to do a music lesson on mixing and looping, they focused on the song 'Somewhere over the rainbow' and used the mixing app Logic pro to match beats to create their own remixes. In English this week we have started a new unit in which the children will write their own leaflets about the charity Stand By Me. In art we learnt why coats of arms were used and designed our own ones based on our hobbies and interests.

#### **Year Six**

Year 6 have been focused this week on preparations for SATS week which begins on 9th May. We have all been hugely impressed with the dedication of the children and have seen them come on leaps and bounds throughout the year so we have been using this time just before the tests to support them in feeling well prepared and confident. We will continue with this strategy next week as we now only have 4 school days before the tests begin. We have some recommendations should your child want or need to do some extra work at home: read every day; use the garage game on Times Table Rockstars every day for around 15 minutes; practise arithmetic methods including long division and long multiplication; and to use the CGP books we have given them to focus on SPAG and Maths topics that they feel less confident in (for example, word classes or percentages). They should also be reassured that they've worked extremely hard this year and have a right to look forward to these tests.

In Maths we have now completed our unit of work on fractions. This week, in particular, the children have been learning about how to recognise and Year Four demonstrate equivalent fractions.



Last Thursday was a very special day for us as it was British Values Day. Year three were discussing and writing about The Rule of Law. We looked at Bible stories including Moses and the Ten Commandments and Daniel. We also looked at a more recent example of someone who got involved in changing laws - Rosa Parks. The day was full of different activities including some drama and the opportunity to write our own commandments. In RE the children started a new topic on the Gospel. So far, they have learnt about the calling of some of the disciples and the healing of a leper. We have discussed how Jesus was a friend to the friendless and how he chose a team to help him change the world for the better. In English we are using a book called Ottoline and the Yellow Cat as a basis for their work. They have used the story to describe two different characters and to evidence from crime scenes. Next week they will be using ideas from the book to study character's feelings and write postcards. In Science we have looked at different parts of the plant and their purposes. Over the next couple of weeks we will find out more about how plants grow and reproduce.
