Dear parents and carers,

I am delighted to be able to welcome everyone back after the summer holidays and to say a special welcome to our new Year Three pupils who have joined us. We trust you will very quickly feel at home at William Ford and that all pupils quickly settle into their new classes and school routines. Already I have been impressed at how hard our Year Threes are working – they seem very grown up and keen to settle into William Ford life. As

part of our commitment to work in partnership with parents and families, we do have a 'meet the Senior Leadership Team' afternoon tea taking place next Wednesday at 2pm. We do hope you will be able to join us. There will be a short presentation and an opportunity to discuss any questions or concerns you may have. This is open to parents in all year groups.

Although the school has been closed to pupils for the past six weeks, much activity has taken place. Perhaps not the most exciting of projects but we do now have new, safer and higher fencing installed across the perimeter of the school. This much needed work protects the site, and its users, from trespassers and intruders (we have had issues with vandalism in the past). We have also continued to decorate inside the school with our new Year Five space area looking fantastic. Finally, some parents may have noticed we have had to say 'goodbye' to two trees in our playground – one that

died and one whose roots were damaging our playground surface. Sadly, tree roots have suddenly become a significant issue for us hence you may well see more development works taking place outside across this year. My thanks to Mrs. Gladden and Mr.

Young for overseeing these works during the holiday.

Speaking of the playground, I was delighted to be able to share with the pupils on Monday our plans for a new playground to be installed during this academic Year! As I shared with the pupils on Monday, I have been working towards this project (and indeed the fencing) for most of the last year, encountering numerous Problems from finance to planning permission. However, if you have a goal it is important to persevere towards it. As a school, we have a goal, or a 'vision' as we often refer to it. This motivates the work that takes place across William Ford. Quite simply, our vision is: Learning from Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, to work diligently, act generously and live at peace with everyone. This is taken from: Psalm 34:14 - Seek peace and pursue it. Over the coming weeks, pupils will elect from their class a representative to the school's eco and community council, worship council and learning council who will help the school in achieving this vision. In addition, each week teachers select a member of the class who have exemplified part of this vision. These are shown on the back page.

Finally, now that pupils are well settled into their new classes, please could I ask that you say goodbye to your children at the school gate and allow them to make their own way to their classrooms. This ensures for a smoother start to the school day by reducing congestion on our school site whilst developing the children's levels of independence. Thank you.

#### **Year Three**

It has been lovely to welcome our new year threes; they are settling really well into their new classes. This week we have been looking at an exciting book called 'Marcy and the Riddle of the Sphinx.' The children have written a description of Marcy's father, Arthur, using expanded noun phrases. In maths we have started to explore place value and we are now learning how to partition and represent numbers in different ways. In history the children have considered the questions of 'What is History?' and 'How do we learn about History?' Over the next few weeks, we will learn about ancient civilisations especially Ancient Egypt. In RE children have been thinking about the Lord's prayer. They decided which was their favourite part, which part applied to them the most and which part was most important. It was great to hear them discuss the prayer with such enthusiasm. On Friday the whole school celebrated Vision Day. In Year Three we were focused on 'working diligently'. The children used art, drama and stories to illustrate the theme. Please ask your children about whether they would like represent their class on Eco Community Council, Learning Council or Worship Council. If they would like this opportunity then please help them to prepare a speech explaining why they should be chosen.

#### **Year Four**

It has been lovely to welcome the children back to school and to settle into our new Year 4 classes. The children have made an excellent start to the year and are already working really hard. We launched straight into the

with children revising place value maths. Our English

unit is based around an adventure story called Nell and the Cave Bear. So far this week, the children have looked the main character Nell as well as the effective noun phrases used in the author's description of the setting. We have also started our sound unit in science by examining how a guitar, a drum and a tuning fork make vibrations that create sound waves. Next week, the children will begin their weekly music lessons each Monday morning during which they will learn to read music as well as play the recorder. Today, we have had lots of exciting activities linked to our Vision Day topic of generosity. The children have enjoyed art and literacybased activities based around what it means to be generous and the benefits that can bring to us all. They also decorated two biscuits each, they enjoyed one of the biscuits themselves and then generously gave away the other one.

#### **Year Five**

We thoroughly enjoyed teaching the Year 5 children and hope they have had a fantastic start too! They settled brilliantly and have been eager to learn. In maths, the children have been looking at place value and how this knowledge will be beneficial in their life. They are now working with numbers up to 1,000,000 – we are very happy with the place value knowledge they have retained from Year 4. Our exciting new English curriculum has meant that the children are reading books that relate to other areas of the curriculum; this half term we are studying Hidden Figures. The children have been inspired by this book and we are proud of the strong

curriculum views that they hold in regards to the segregation of black and white people in America in the 1940's. English lessons have involved hot seating where the children took on the role of Dorothy Vaughan – I am sure your children can tell you who this inspirational woman is! In RE, the children have been looking at the story of Moses and the burning bush. As a class, we looked in detail at Paul Koni's 'The Burning Bush' and how this symbolises God. As part of our space unit in science, the children will have received their very first piece of homework! We would like the children to study the moon over the course of the next two weeks - this information will become handy in the coming weeks. We hope you have a restful weekend.

#### **Year Six**

What a fantastic start to the year we have had in Year Six. We have begun looking at Victorian Britain in a number of cross curricular



ways already, for example, we have been reading Street Child, based in London during the Victorian era, in English and shared reading. We have discussed the big questions for the start of our history, Religious Education and science units and are really looking forward to discovering more about Victorian Britain, creation and evolution and inheritance respectively. In maths, the children have been thinking about place value in very large numbers and have been working with numbers up to 10 million. Our Vision Day activities have centred around the part of our school vision that asks us to 'seek peace and pursue it'. Their creative sides were shining through as they made stained glass windows, poems and prayers.
