## Year Three

What a week we have had in Year 3! They seem to have packed a lot of learning into such a short time! In Maths, we have now finished our unit on place value and have begun a new unit-addition and subtraction. So far, the children have been using their number bonds and adding single digits but next week they will progress onto adding tens and hundreds as well as looking for patterns. In English the children have been learning about writing in the past progressive tense in readiness to use it in their stories. ## Year Four

This week in maths, the children have been learning how to complete column subtraction involving exchanging. Once they got to grips with this method of

subtraction, they were introduced to other efficient methods of subtraction which they were encouraged to choose from depending on the calculations set. In English this week, the children have worked hard on their half term assessment where they planned, wrote and then edited their own adventure story. The Year Four teachers were impressed with the effort that the children put into their stories and have enjoyed reading them. In our art lesson this week, the children have made Christmas cards but don't worry we haven't started the countdown to Christmas in October! In PSHE we have shared our ideas about our rights, responsibilities, rewards and consequences at school, resulting in many interesting conversations and discussions in our groups. Next week, our final Year 5 class will be visiting The Museum of London and St. Paul's Cathedral as part of our Art and Design topic looking at architecture.

## Year Six

In maths, it's been all hands-on deck with division, the children have learnt how to divide using factors, learnt two different techniques to do long division. Next week we will do look at multi-step problems, order of operations and mental calculations and estimations.
