Dear parents and carers,

Why was the school closed on Tuesday? What is the point of teacher training days? Is this just an extra 'day off' for teachers? These are common questions that get asked across the country when schools are closed. Under UK law, schools are required to allocate five days across the term for staff development. Usually, these are added on to the end

of school holidays. Often schools host these themselves but occasionally, outside providers are used. In this instance, we wanted to support our feeder school Village Infants in arranging a training day for the 29th November as that was the only availability for their choice of provider. This also allowed us to bring in an external consultant who worked with teachers around the idea of using enterprise in the curriculum: developing what we call 'purposeful learning.' This means placing the class in role as experts with the aim of delivering a required outcome. Sounds complicated? Basically, instead of telling pupils to 'write about the Romans,' we are looking at telling pupils they are working for the BBC to write a documentary about the Romans. Other ideas include creating their own art galleries to raise money for our charity or to create their own weather forecasts as part of learning about maps and weather. This was an intense day for teachers (certainly not a day off) although we did enjoy some pizza at lunch time! What is the purpose of this? We hope by implementing the curriculum in this

manner we will 'open the eyes' of the pupils to a whole new world of possibilities for future careers: that they will get a taste of new jobs that they never knew existed. Even through the trips that we run, we

hope this provides some insight. On our trip to France the pupils were told about jobs such

as ferry captain, chocolate maker, coach driver, baker, ferry chef - the list is endless.

As part of this valuable curriculum work, last Friday Year Five enjoyed a talk from two different individuals who worked in infrastructure and construction.

William Ford are now part of 'Primary Futures: Building Future London' - through this programme, the children understand the world of construction and infrastructure, the range of jobs available, and the link between learning and work. It challenges stereotypes and broaden horizons for pupils, showing that, whatever their background, they can access the amazing range of opportunities the sectors have to offer. The children heard from a chartered engineer, who has a significant role in the safety of cars, that works at Ford and a rail system engineer who designed the Transport for London's central line! The questions asked by the pupils were thoughtful and the volunteers

loans, grants and support from the local authority and Diocese of Chelmsford which have all been an answer to prayer. Who knows? In the future maybe some of our pupils

from William Ford may be working in industries involved in the design and installation of new playgrounds, involved in securing finance or working in project management. I also hope that perhaps we have a few future teachers and even some Headteachers in our cohorts as well.

Year Four

This week in Year Four, the children have focused their attention on using different types of fronted adverbials in their writing. This can be a tricky task, and we have been pleased with the effort the children have put in to their work. In science, the children were given the opportunity to explore switches within

making their own switches. They came up with an imaginative range of switches which worked within their circuits. In maths, the children continued using their multiplication tables knowledge to help them tackle a range of word problems before moving on to exploring the 11 times table and division facts. As we are coming to the end of our RE unit on Hinduism this week, the children are in the process of taking part in an activity to assess their progress and understanding. Pupils will be explaining how Hindu beliefs affect how they live their lives. Pupils are also comparing Hindu beliefs with Christian beliefs, as well as their own core beliefs. In geography, pupils have explored Indian culture and how this has impacted the culture in the UK. This was a thoroughly enjoyed topic and one that we will be exploring further, during India day next week! With that in mind, we want to remind you that India day takes place on the 7th December and we are very much looking forward to the flavours, artistic influences and cultural exploration that we have in store for Year 4. We are encouraging all Year 4 pupils to come dressed in Indian-inspired clothing. If you need any help with ideas for this, please see any member of the Year 4 team. Year Five

Well done to Year 5 for completing another successful week. In our English lessons this week, the children enjoyed exploring the main character in the text and considered reasons for their actions based on their developing knowledge of Syria. Next week, our pupils will be applying some of the grammatical techniques in writing, which we also learned this week, to describe key events in our novel. In Music, we learned what a chord is and have begun to learn to play the chord sequence of the 12-bar Blues using glockenspiels.



Next week, the children will develop their musical understanding and will learn to play a Blues scale using what we call 'bent notes.'

Year Six

This week in English, the children have researched about the life of Mary Anning and they have used the information they gathered to write another biography, making improvements from the Charles Darwin biography they wrote last week. We took a look at a range of homophones and their meanings during our grammar lesson in order to avoid mixing up those common ones in our writing. In maths, we focussed on dividing fractions by any integer and working out fractions of amounts. The children have really improved in their fraction knowledge! In RE this week, the children used the story of Daniel in the Den of Lions to find evidence of what God is like. They then created a symbol to represent the qualities of God. In music, we have continued to explore the Kodaly method of learning music. The children have been performing and creating music in this style. During our history lesson, the children used a piece of non-fiction text to find out about Sarah Forbes Bonetta, ask them what they have learned about this interesting woman! Next week we will be making connections between Bible texts and what Christians believe about God through how churches are designed in RE; investigating what we need in order to be able to see objects in science and finishing off our unit on fractions in maths.
