Dear parents/carers and pupils,

This has been a very challenging week. As you are aware, we do have a number of adult COVID cases across the school resulting in others having to self-isolate. As I am sure you can appreciate, this has been difficult for the school to manage and we thank you for your continued patience and support at this extremely challenging time. Whilst we are grateful for your support, I do imagine you probably have some questions. How has the

school gone from having very few cases to so many? What has changed? Is the school safe? I will do my best to address these for you.

As we are all aware, COVID-19 is a highly infectious virus that transmits easy. The effect it can have on adults is usually much more significant than the effect it has on children. As a result, the school has implemented a range of measures including: keeping pupils in smaller groups away from others; increasing cleaning routines; introducing a new entrance to the school to improve social distancing along with asking parents and visitors to wear marks. We have been keeping adults socially distanced within school by limiting numbers in the staffroom and ensuring any gatherings of staff are only in large, well ventilated areas.

Sadly, nearly all of the adult cases have started at once and have not presented with the usual symptoms. All staff who have felt unwell have tried to book tests, but some were informed that their current symptoms made them ineligible and that they did not have the virus. Sadly, this does seem to have caused a mini outbreak amongst staff.

Ever since schools returned in September, all staff have been acutely aware that they are at a higher risk of catching Covid-19 yet they have gone about their daily work with care, skill and professionalism: ensuring that all pupils are cared for, kept safe and educated. The need to keep their distance from pupils is something that no adult likes yet such measures have protected our pupil population. Every day, they greet each pupil with a smile: they reassure any nervous child (or parent) with regards to the school's safety measures and they ensure our school continues to be a happy, fun-filled place of learning whilst managing their own anxieties about the virus. For this, I cannot thank them enough.

I am not able or willing to disclose the medical details about staff members but I can share that I am one of the staff members who has tested positive, and has been rather ill with the virus. My symptoms began Friday night, and I was tested on Saturday. Why am I telling you this? Because I can personally testify to the effects of Covid-19: the exhaustion, the breathlessness and the fear that things may get worse. Fortunately, I do feel that I have been lucky and am on the mend. I look forward to being back in school early next week and I cannot thank Mrs. Legg enough for the fantastic job she has done in stabilising the school community and for covering my

Please do continue to do everything you can to support us. Please do socially distance and wear a mask at the gate. Please use the back gate if your child is in Years 4 or 5 and you do not need to collect from Village Infants. The extra safety this provides *is* worth the extra five minute walk. Finally, if you or your child are showing any symptoms, please arrange a test and do not attend school. Failing to abide by these measures not only places you and your family at risk but also the whole school community.

Above all, do pass on your thanks and good wishes to the staff. You may not like all of the decisions that we make but they are made to protect everyone's safety and there are a lot of measures imposed that are outside of our control.

I look forward to seeing you all again soon.


Year Five

This week we have begun looking at statistics in maths: reading and interpreting data in tables and graphs. In our English/geography crosscurricular topic on St Lucia, the children started researching information about another of the endangered species in the Caribbean - the sea turtle. They have been finding out about its habitat and lifecycle and the things that humans may be able to do to protect them. The children then began to devise posters describing the threats and the potential strategies to save them.

In art, we have continued to look at the famous Hundertwasserhaus in Vienna and the children have been developing their designs for decorating the exterior, beginning to work with oil pastels.

In history, the children have been looking at religion in Anglo-Saxon Britain and comparing life then and now.

In science, the children were beginning to find out about Isaac Newton and, in particular, his discovery of gravity. Now that the children are currently working from home, with the exception of art, work has been set via our Purple Mash platform, which builds on the work that we began earlier in the week in each of these subjects. There is additionally an RE task of reading about the special pilgrimage for Muslims known as the Hajj, where the children have been asked to imagine being at the Hajj and sending a postcard home informing everyone at home about it.



Year Six

In Year 6 this week, the children's science and written work has focused on the inspirational life and work of Mary Anning.

They have researched her childhood and upbringing and her dedication to investigating fossils found



on the beach of her hometown, Lyme Regis, in Dorset. They have all been fascinated by the fossils of the ichthyosaur and the plesiosaur that she first discovered. They were surprised to discover that she was not recognised in her lifetime. The children have started to write their own biographies of her pioneering work and fascinating life.

In maths, the children have continued to work with fractions. They have investigated how to find fractions of quantities and have used their knowledge to complete a range of word problems.
