Dear parents/carers and pupils,

Welcome back after what I hope was a lovely, relaxing half term break. Certainly the weather was interesting with us still having the remains of the recent snowfall at the start of the holiday compared with temperatures of over 16° C at the end.

I am sure like me, you were delighted last Monday when our Prime Minister announced the reopening of schools to take place on Monday 8th March 2021. You all would have received a letter from me on Wednesday providing confirmation that William Ford will reopen along with some of our requests and safeguarding measures against the virus. There are still some details we need to arrange hence next week we will be able to outline our reopening plan in much more detail. Whilst we are planning to reintroduce staggered starts for different year groups, we hope a further uptake in the number of families using our rear park gate will allow us to further reduce these measures.

One thing that is for certain is that our COVID safeguarding measures will continue. Hand hygiene remains as important as ever and we do ask, in order to keep the whole school community safe, is that you continue to obey all social distancing legislation including limiting social contacts and not arranging birthday parties, playdates and sleepovers. We would also ask that pupils do undertake weekly testing at a local centre, especially if they are showing any form of illness. This drastically reduces the likelihood of COVID entering the school and classes/bubbles having to isolate. Staff will be undertaking twice-weekly testing.

Along with this newsletter, you will also receive a letter from Matthew Cole, the Director of Public Health for Barking and Dagenham. Please do read this and Follow the advice given.

Before half term we celebrated no screen Friday and it was truly impressive to see range of exciting, engaging activities that took place within homes, gardens and during periods of outdoor exercise that did not involve a screen. My hope is that when life does one day return to normal – which it will – children and families will continue to enjoy such pursuits and activities, especially as the weather improves.

Although life remains challenging and difficult at the moment, we have much to thank God for and to look forward to in the future. As Captain Tom said so well, "Tomorrow will be a good day" and I, along with the rest of the staff, cannot wait to be able to fully open our doors and move into a position where we actively welcome and encourage school attendance rather than having to bar children from the building. In the short time before this though, please do persevere with the home learning. We know it is not always easy but your child will thank you for this in the future.


An email would have been out earlier today asking parents to please complete the online information form for us to ensure we have the correct information for your child and contact details in the event of an emergency.



BOOK DAY


4 MARCH 2021

With the beginning of a new half-term we have started a number of new topics this week.

Over the next few weeks our English unit will be focusing on persuasive writing, working towards writing a persuasive letter to the Mayor of London. This week the children have started looking at the features of persuasive writing, trying to differentiate between fact and opinion and then learning how to elaborate on a point.

In maths we have continued to work on fractions adding 3 or more fractions and adding and subtracting fractions including mixed numbers.

The children have been learning about the charity Christian Aid in RE and creating a poster persuading others to support the charity.


In art, we have begun a new topic of 'Design for Purpose' with the children

This week in Year 6, pupils have been enjoying using a short story full of suspense and surprises called Moving House in their English lessons. They have analysed author techniques as well as writing a letter as a character and an alternative ending. In maths, pupils have been revising how to find the area of a triangle. They have been introduced to a new unit of science on 'Light' and we hope to be able to do some investigations together when we are all back! They also been introduced to a new history unit about World War One starting by looking at the complex causes of this war. In photography, the pupils have been playing with perspective to create interesting optical illusions. In computing, they have been writing embedded repeat loops to create complex repeated patterns.
